# New CDC Guidance—May 13, 2021—This guidance DOES NOT apply to any healthcare setting

CDC announced that fully vaccinated people no longer need to wear a mask or physically distance in any setting, except where required by federal, state, local, tribal, or territorial laws, rules, and regulations, including local business and workplace guidance. Fully vaccinated people can also refrain from testing following a known exposure unless they are residents or employees of a correctional or detention facility or a homeless shelter. https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/vaccines/fully-vaccinated-guidance.html

#### **Vaccine Questions & Answers**

Q: If staff is already vaccinated, do we still need to do education if they have already been vaccinated?

A: No, according to the CMS QSO. "CMS added new requirements at §483.80(d)(3)(i)-(vii) for LTC facilities to develop policies and procedures to educate residents or resident representatives and staff regarding the benefits and potential side effects associated with the COVID-19 vaccine and offer the vaccine unless it is medically contraindicated or the resident or staff member has already been immunized."

**Q:** Is there a standardized tool that you recommend for patient and staff education regarding the vaccine, such as a VIS, or could the COVID EUA Fact sheet be used?

**Q:** Our facility is having difficulty administering vaccine doses on time because the pharmacy is backed up. How can we get our hands on the vaccines so we can administer in a timely manner?

**A:** Reach out to other pharmacies that are receiving COVID-19 vaccine (LTC pharmacies participating in the Federal Retail Pharmacy Program: <a href="https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/covid-19/downloads/participating-ltc-pharmacy-list.pdf">https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/covid-19/downloads/participating-ltc-pharmacy-list.pdf</a>). In addition, you may also reach out to your local health department.

Q: If someone has been fully vaccinated by a World Health Organization (WHO) vaccine (i.e. Sinopharm), can we offer them an FDA authorized vaccine? Note that Sinopharm is the vaccine from China, but the research shows it has low efficacy.

**A:** According to the CDC clinical guidance, if someone has been fully vaccinated by a COVID-19 vaccine with WHO Emergency Use Listing, they are considered fully vaccinated and do not need any additional doses of vaccine. https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/covid-19/info-by-product/clinical-considerations.html

**Q:** Do we need to test fully vaccinated visitors?

**A:** CDPH AFL 20-22.7 only requires testing of visitors if your facility is in a purple tier. Testing visitors in red, orange, and yellow tiers is an option to augment prevention, but not a requirement.

**Q:** Do other employees have a right to know which staff members are not vaccinated?

**A:** They do not have a right to know due to privacy issues, but it's important to plan out group activities and dining situations in advance to ensure only fully vaccinated staff and residents are participating without masks and distancing. By default, you cannot assume everyone is fully vaccinated, so be cautious and when in doubt, always wear a mask and practice distancing.

**Q:** How can we find out if our new admission is vaccinated?

A: SNFs should enroll in the California Immunization Registry (CAIR2) <a href="https://cairweb.org/enroll-now/">https://cairweb.org/enroll-now/</a> to record vaccine doses administered and get access to immunization records (such as flu, COVID-19, pneumococcal vaccine, and others). CAIR2 is a secure, confidential, statewide computerized immunization information system for California residents. Facilities can request an account with the immunization registry that serves their county by visiting the registry website.

Q: Does a family member or resident have the right to request that only fully vaccinated staff care for them? A: Regardless of the vaccination status,

Families and residents can certainly make the request, just like they may request their favorite HCP to care for them, however, you can stress that all HCP are taking the same precautions regardless of vaccination including proper PPE, universal masking, maintaining safe distance. It would be nice to be able to honor that request, but it may not always be possible. It would be good to reassure families and residents that your HCP are following the right procedures for infection prevention.

## **Other Questions & Answers**

Q: On the CDPH Daily 123 Survey, a question says: "Today's Isolated COVID-19 Status, who are in Isolation—Enter the number of residents who are currently under isolation due to laboratory positive or suspected COVID-19 status, if applicable." My question is, does this include everyone in the yellow zone?

A: Remember that there is a distinction between quarantine vs. isolation status. Isolation is used for individuals that are COVID positive and in the red zone. This question is not asking you to include individuals in the yellow zone under quarantine or observation. It is only asking for residents that are isolated in the red zone, meaning they are COVID positive.

**Q:** Is there any specific guidance on the use of personal oscillating fans within patient rooms and/or common areas and is that different than overhead fans?

A: There are concerns about the use of fans, especially if the fan is placed in such a way that it is blowing potentially contaminated air from one person to another. Regardless of the county tier it is important to ensure that fans are used in a safe manner. Fans can be used to help improve ventilation, especially if the room has an open window. It is important that the fan doesn't blow potentially contaminated air from one resident to another or into the common area of the facility. If the fan can be put it in the window that would be preferable. The bottom line is we want to avoid having fans blowing air from the infected person's airspace around them over another person. Positioning of the fan is key. One suggestion to verify how the air is moving is to close the door and put a piece of paper under the door. If the air blows the paper out of the room and into the hallway, then you'll know it has a positive pressure relationship. If it gets sucked back in, then you'll know there is negative pressure. The point is you don't want the air to be pushed out into parts of the building where people are not wearing PPE.

**Q:** Is there any guidance for green zone residents having their doors closed?

**A:** The doors do not need to be closed for green zone residents.

Q: Is the CDPH training for IP online training different from the CDC IP training? Are both required? A: Only one of these courses is required for the initial training. If you took the CDC class prior to 2021, you can take the CDPH class to fulfill the yearly 10-hour CE required. However, there is no partial credit for the CDPH class. You would need to take the entire 14-hour course. The CDPH class is much more relevant to California activities and requirements.

Q: For pediatric patients, if the family is not vaccinated, can they have physical contact if they don PPE?

A: For pediatric patients, the family can have full contact with PPE if they are unvaccinated. Now pediatric patients between the ages of 12 to 15 are eligible for the vaccination themselves. Strongly encourage visitors to get vaccinated so that physical contact would be more allowable.

**Q:** If a fully vaccinated resident needs a nebulizer treatment but has a fully vaccinated roommate, how do we handle this situation? Will there be updated guidance?

**A:** I am not aware that there will be updated guidance to the recommended PPE or infection control process during aerosol generating procedures with vaccination status. While vaccination does provide a tremendous level of safety, PPE needs to be worn by HCP when indicated for transmission-based precautions when caring for a positive individual regardless of the vaccination status. We have recommended in general, especially with individuals with confirmed COVID, to try to transition the nebulizers to inhalers; or administer them in a private room. HCP should wear appropriate PPE. If it is impossible for a private room, then a fully vaccinated roommate is preferred with the curtains drawn and as much physical space as possible. There are facilities that have faced this situation that have added air scrubbers or worked on improving the ventilation and air exchange in those rooms to get more outdoor air.

**Q:** Are fully vaccinated dialysis patients able to transfer to the green zone, or do they need to stay in the yellow zone?

**A:** There is no requirement by CDPH to place dialysis residents in the yellow zone unless there has been a known exposure. They have always been allowed to go to the green zone, unless your local health department has a different requirement.

**Q:** Is there any guidance for getting a second opinion for tests, rather than simply accepting a positive PCR as it is? We have had situations where a resident tested positive with one lab, but then tested negative with another lab?

**Q:** Arizona is gathering specimen from breakthrough cases for genomic sequencing to identify the virus lineage. Does California do the same?

**A:** Yes, contact your local public health department for assistance. You can also contact the CDPH HAI program at <a href="https://example.com/HAIprogram@cdph.ca.gov">HAIprogram@cdph.ca.gov</a> to help facilitate additional investigation in whole genome testing, especially in fully vaccinated individuals or variants.

Q: Los Angeles and eight other counties are in the yellow tier according to the Blueprint for a Safer Economy <a href="https://covid19.ca.gov/safer-economy/">https://covid19.ca.gov/safer-economy/</a>. Do we still need to use eyewear in the green zone? A: No, eyewear is not required in yellow tier counties because according to CDC guidance, eyewear is not required in communities with low/minimal community transmission. Double check with your local health department to make sure that is consistent with their requirements.
