Current COVID Issues

- COVID 19 Cases increased nationwide
- Simultaneously other states scaled COVID 19 testing
- New COVID-19 constraints for California
 - Previous testing 80,000-90,000/ day
 - July 4th -- 127,000 tests
 - Now consistently >120K
- Resulting in <u>increased</u>:
 - Scheduling times
 - Number of specimens received at the labs
 - Turnaround times
- Impacts
 - Timely clinical care
 - Contact Tracing
 - Epidemic Control

Meeting with Stakeholders (7-3-20)

- Experience on the ground-
 - Supplies for testing were being held back from labs
 - To limit the number of tests coming in for processing each day
- Resulting in test sites closing
- Laboratories still had available capacity to test
 - ≥ 400 total (high and medium throughput)
 - Perform 66K in an 8 hour period.
 - Total capacity 190-200 tests (If labs run 24 hours)

Solution

- Matchmake --TTF Lab List (labs meet CDPH LFS criteria)
 - Licensure-- Federal CLIA certified and California state licensed
 - FDA EUA approval
 - Reporting to CalREDIE
 - Registered with Laboratory Field Services
 - Willing to contract for more testing
- Learned new issues
 - Most organizations contracted with 2-3 major labs
 - Those labs using similar testing instruments
 - Those instruments having supply issues with reagents and plastics trays pipette tips
- Contract hardwired
- Larger labs subcontract with smaller labs

High Level Meeting (7-10-20)

- Labs willing to sub contract
 - Initial processing- very long if by hand
 - Electronic Registration
 - No Mark Up clause- TTF is working to address this
- Larger labs could have capacity to further expand
 - Workforce shortage
 - Require Executive Order- (April 2020)
 - · Waived CA state regulatory personnel requirements for the duration of the emergency
 - Based on federal CMS CLIA personnel requirements— not yet lowered
- Testing prioritization guidance to decrease unnecessary testing
 - Released 7-14-20
 - Tier 1- Hospitalized, PH Outbreak Investigation
 - Tier Two- live, work stay congregate setting, hospital admission and d/c to congregate setting
- Results Transmission
- Ongoing weekly meeting for trouble shoot

Additional Strategies

- CA State- Manufacture own supplies for long term solutions
 - Reagents and plastics many currently FDA approved
 - Proprietary FDA EUS
- Develop own test platforms
 - Solidified deal with historic CDPH contractor
 - New platforms
 - FDA EUA compatible for multiple existing platforms

- New deal being solidified with Transport Media Company that is local to CA
- Pooling tests
 - Guidance written
 - Partners study
 - FDA EUA applications under review
 - Labs sharing their approval package with others
